

he Design History & Development of the 41 International Collar medallion & subsequent pocket jewels, remains sketchy & unclear. Although I did try and research but did not come up with anything substantial. Net searches show up a few recent medallions (all circular in shape). The reason I write this, is that it seems that the earlier square medallion (suspended diagonally) do not exist anymore and have been phased out. That being said, I am sure that the initial designs of any kind are the work of an individual (or a group of individuals) with a design bent of mind, who put forward a proposal for approval to a Board or a larger body before being put into production.

Closer to home, a similar square medallion attached to a thin blue collar ribbon was presented to the 3rd 41er President Sagar Gulati (who never actually wore it as Prez.), which was then handed over to the 4th President Ethiraj in 1983-84, who was the first Prez. to actually wear it (see image attached). This was the beginning of its journey in India. Over the years the Square diagonal remained the original, with the Ribbon being changed from time to time. It went onto being a






broader blue ribbon & then changed to the now familiar tricolor (probably adapted from the already established RT Prez. Jewel). The square medallion lasted from 1983-84 (41er Prez. Ethiraj) and was last seen to be worn in 2012-13 by (41er Prez. Rohit Pombra). This is as per my observation whilst working on the 41er archives over the years. Where the original medallion disappeared, or who decided to change it & why remains unclear, but a large oversized new medallion was seen to be worn from 2013-14 (Prez. Ajit Khullar) upto & inclusive of 2015-16 (41er Prez. Chettiar).

At this point in time, being the Archives (& Regalia) convenor, through all my researches I had made a presentation to the 2015-16 board & 2016-17 board, highlighting gross anomalies in shapes, design, logo, ribbon colours across all the prevalent regalia (including the tricolor used in both direction, worn by all the headboard members). I will not get into the other anomalies in detail. It was decided within the board to look into the matter & come up with suitable options. The first job was to streamline the 41er Logo itself as there were several variations. The current design

& colours (see images attached) were subsequently worked upon & finalized over two boards. A test sample of each was made (including stitching & shape of the collars, fonts, colours & details and given to sectt.). The new medallions came into being at the end of 2016-17 (41er Prez. Gopal Chopra).

Since there is no control on vendors (who may change from time to time), and since the sectt. staff handles orders & their production, I have already observed differences creeping into various aspects of the regalia. But then I don't think it's a major concern to anyone.






tell the driver he could eat what ever he wants at our restaurant, incentive for my next ride.

i friends, I have been asked to write about Artificial Intelligence. I will try to make is as simple to understand as possible. However, use of some technical terms becomes unavoidable.

AI sounds like a very complex and in the current times, a

very fashionable term.

The evolution of AI saw in the initial stage, Machine learning, in which systems (a term used for a combination of programs) learnt from historical data provided to them. **Then came Deep Learning where the** systems mimicked the human brain.

In the simplest of words, Artificial Intelligence is the intelligence of machines basedonaprogramprimarily written by humans that allows computers/machines to simulate humans. This human like behaviour comprehension, includes problem solving, decision making, creativity and autonomy.

The evolution of AI saw in the initial stage, Machine learning, in which systems (a term used for a combination of programs) learnt from historical data provided to

them. Then came Deep Learning where the systems mimicked the human brain. Currently we are in the Generative AI stage in which Deep Learning models create original content.

The heart of the AI is an advanced computer. A power connection is like its veins and blood. The program fed into the computer is like muscles and bones. The interfaces like a

keyboard, camera, audio input device (microphone), other sensory devices (can include a bio sensor, thermometer, barometer, odour sensor) are its senses. And an internet connection is the oxygen it breathes and the food it eats.

It gets most of its growth and energy from the internet connection.


There can be stand alone systems without an internet connection capable of performing learning but the learning will be limited to the data it is provided and the data of its past actions.

Once connected to the internet it can take wings and perform some amazing feats.

Today Generative AI can do tasks like write a letter, create a website, appear for an examination and also solve problems that require intuitive inputs.

It would be important to note that Chat GPT 3 (the hottest AI tool) will not include data after 2020 or 2021. So the out put or the solution to a problem it gives would be limited to the data on or before 2020. It will help you understand that ultimately AI is restricted by its primary program.

The challenge is when the AI program in a system has been designed to learn from information available to it and evolve



without any restriction, meaning it can change its primary program by itself. These kinds of programs are perceived as threat in the future by some eminent people like Elon Musk who advocate strict monitoring and legal restrictions for AI systems.

For a live experience click on https:// chatgpt.com/ and in the search window that appears, type "how does Elon musk see generative AI". Next type "List of air accidents in 2023" followed by "What can be done to reduce such accidents" and then followed by "What can you do to reduce such accidents"

This will give you an idea about what chat GPT can and can not do. It will also

give you an idea that if such programs are connected with delivery control systems (I am using this term so that its easy to understand) like the command of an air craft or command of a computer based city traffic management system or command of a weapons system along with the power to change its primary program based on data from the internet..... it may one day decide that aircrafts should fly upside down to ensure better fuel economy or it may decide that yellow should be used for go signal and the weapons should first destroy the individual that created it.










SPOTLIGHT 41er R.V. Rajan A Life of Service, Creativity, and Impact

His most recent book, *Durga Nivas - Biography of a Building*, released on September 1, 2024, joins an impressive bibliography, including *Rajan's Random Reflections* and *The Search*, a Tamil-to-English translation. Rajan leaves his legacy and footprints on the sands of time of every institution he serves.
