


On the Global Stage

My experiences with 41 INTERNATIONAL -DR. Siddharthan, President 2025-26

28 September 2002:

t was my good friends Mohan Rajes and Jugnu Uberoi who introduced me to the world of 41 International. The 41 INTERNATIONAL HYM (half yearly meeting) held at Bangalore on 28th September 2002 provided me the first glimpse and experience of 41 INTERNATIONAL. My association with Past President 41 India and Past International Secretary Kishore Sahani planted the seed of interest in my mind to serve 41 INTERNATIONAL. When Past President 41 India N.S. Krishna Kumar (K.K) was elected Vice President of 41 INTERNATIONAL, I travelled with him for several country AGMs and International meetings. My desire to serve International grew stronger and I expressed my interest to K.K.



I also had the opportunity to represent 41 India in the 35th AGM in Toulouse, France as Councilor. I observed the proceedings keenly and thought that it was my field of interest and expertise.

It so happened that France decided to pull out of 41 INTERNATIONAL at the Chennai AGM in 2012. The Secretary then was from France and as his country withdrew from International membership, he had no choice but to resign a year ahead of the completion of his term. There was no time to call for nominations and vote in the AGM so the International Board decided to appoint an interim Secretary for one

year using the International Rule 8(b) which provides the emergency powers to the Board to decide on administrative matters. Since I had expressed my interest in serving 41 INTERNATIONAL, K.K suggested my name to the Board having been convinced of my capacity to handle the portfolio.

The International Board unanimously approved my appointment as Interim secretary of 41 INTERNATIONAL.

Opportunity

I took up the post of International Secretary against all odds. The former Secretary had left without preparing the minutes of the AGM and had not transferred any document of 41 INTERNATIONAL. K.K helped me put together the minutes of the AGM and I made a good start and my year as Interim Secretary went smoothly.

I took full advantage of the opportunity to introduce several changes for the betterment of the Organization. My performance as Interim Secretary impressed the member countries resulting in my election as Secretary 41 INTERNATIONAL for the term 2013-16 at the Interlaken AGM in 2013.



During my tenure as international secretary I introduced a host of new concepts like a monthly newsletter reaching out to all members of 41 international, an admin handbook which included details of the tasks for all the officers of 41 INTERNATIONAL, a working agenda and an agenda booklet and PowerPoint to keep meetings organized, interesting and on time and maintaining a digital record facilitating easy storage and retrieval of data.

Continuous learning

Working with 4 International Presidents has provided me incomparable experience in leadership. Each President adapted a different leadership styles and I could absorb the best from each leader.





dreams, Mumbai. Life has come a full circle

I was clear technology & computer science was my area of passion though my father was a physics major and wanted me to pursue career in physics. Coming from a family of both parents working, I always knew I would be a working professional for I knew no other way. My mother, who displayed balancing career, children, and husband, was a real possibility, was my role model. Therefore, the start was set!

The goal you set for yourself is not always easy to achieve. It is not a bed of roses; even the most beautiful rose has thorns! Thinking back, 28 years ago, when I had started my career, honestly I did not dream of where I want to reach in my career. Nevertheless, as the years went by, I was sure I wanted be the CEO of an organization at least when I reach 20-25 years of work experience. What I surely did was, set smaller achievable goals for myself. Always tracked my progress and never let setbacks derail me from my long term plans.

I learnt, the only way to achieve your set goals is to "be stubborn" with an unwavered desire to keep moving forward. Take a moment to pause and learn from the situation, so 1) you know you don't want the same to happen again 2) what key learning are you taking along the journey. Remember that not every day will be the same and hence if you are having a bad day – this too shall pass

There is a huge dearth of female role models in corporate world especially in the field of technology + finance. Therefore, self-motivation has to be very strong. So how do you do that? Build a network of mentors for yourself, since I already mentioned lack of women role models, dip into the men who can take role of mentors for you – could be your father, brother, husband, past colleagues, etc. I cannot emphasize how much this is important, as there will be a ton of situations you will face, where self-validation will be important for you to move forward. These mentors may or may not be from your field, but will be very strong sounding boards.

Balancing Act of Managing Work, Family, and Personal Growth is in the



hands of each one of us. No one from outside can decide how you will do that. If there is a motivation to achieve professional growth, there will be a desire to balance work and family. For me, delegation of responsibilities has

worked very well. My husband and children are my cheerleaders every single day. They help me balance my life so much so even after 28 years of exceptional corporate experience, I am able to choose to sign up for academic learning experience.

My formula for success has been: ABCD

- Attitude: Positive behavior, be bold - show bold/
- Build your Brand: Be authentic; YOU are your own brand; be confident / show confidence / clear thoughts and communication is key; practice it!
- Command the room: make your presence felt in a call/meeting always go prepared. speak up
- **Delegate:** Do not do tasks that others can do. Don't stress yourself by wanting to do it all!!

Leadership Lessons I Learned

- Expertise: Know your domain – be an expert – there are no shortcuts to knowledge
- **Self-Awareness:** clarity of thought on who you are, focus on "strengths", there are many who there who point out the areas of improvement;
- **Communication:** Build ability to articulate thoughts clearly.

Be decisive!

- Walk the talk: only speak what you believe. People can see through b***s***t.
 - **Build risk appetite:** jump into tough projects and strive to emerge as a winner! The only way to build your confidence!
- Last but not the least, be a mentor/coach to the next generation so we build a female leadership pipeline to grow India! In closing, all I can say is you have one life, live well. Be strong, invest in yourself, take your chances, fail but get back on your feet, build a support system. Fly high, be humble, spread happiness.

I cultivated a holistic vision where every department's goals aligned with the company's broader objectives. This clarity allowed me to lead with confidence and inspire my team to pursue innovation. Support from my

family, particularly my husband, was instrumental in this journey. Together, we worked tirelessly to introduce innovative, eco-friendly, and recyclable plastic formworks to the market, gaining the trust of contractors and businesses across India. Networking played a pivotal role too. I joined associations like NAREDCO Mahi and Builders' Association of India, not only to represent women in the construction industry but also to share my vision of sustainability and innovation.

Promising Start to Fundraising & Corporate Alliances The first quarter has been an eventful and productive phase, significant developments with and achievements in both Fund Raising & Corporate Alliance. These efforts have been instrumental in supporting various impactful projects, including the FTDE and SYJ initiatives, the Mother & Child Project, and the TPAF Paediatric Liver Transplant Project.

Fundraising Success.

TPAF Collaboration: The Association of 41 Clubs of India has proudly partnered with The Pravin Agarwal Foundation (TPAF), an initiative by Mr. Pravin Agarwal, Chairman of Sterlite Power Transmission Ltd and a past member of Patna Mid-Town Round Table 58. This collaboration enables us to facilitate paediatric liver transplants by contributing just Rs 1 lakh per transplant, making









a life-saving difference. Moreover, this contribution is eligible for 80G tax exemption.

So far, we have successfully raised Rs 10 lakhs, covering 10 transplants, with commitments for 6 more in the pipeline. Our ambitious yet achievable goal is to support at least 50 paediatric liver transplants, ensuring access to critical healthcare for children in need. The total outlay for these 10 transplants stands at Rs 160 lakhs.

FTDE/SYJ Projects: Numerous transformative projects have already been successfully completed, with many more in progress.

20,000 feet Journey to Mentok Kangri

ife is either a Daring Adventure or Nothing", said Helen Keller. Isn't that inspiring and challenging at the same time? A 20,000 feet hike in the middle of deep crevasses, ice, snow and thin air? Why not?!! That's how it all started, and I signed up for the hike to Mentok Kangri in Ladakh.

At 20,000 feet (6,000+ Metres), there is only 45% oxygen in the air when compared to sea level. You will feel breathless all the time. Your blood oxygen concentration will only be 80%, compared to a typical 98%. To do a hike of this nature, you need to be fit. Period. No escaping this reality! You should have excellent cardiovascular fitness, body





strength and flexibility to be able to climb and clamber over rocks and snow ice, that too in thin air.

My trek to Mentok Kangri started from Delhi airport. I took a short flight to Leh, Ladakh, and landed in in an airport nestled in-between tall snow-capped mountains. For acclimatization, we stayed in Leh for a day, and then did a couple of road trips including Kardungla Pass. Because of the unique geology of Ladakh, the ultra-tall mountains are mostly barren and made up of loose rocks, boulders, slate and sand. The

landscape looked out of the World, as if we were on Mars or Moon!

Then we drove from Leh to Karzok, which is located by the banks of Tsomoriri Lake, that is 26 kms across. This is a fivehour drive on a scenic road laid by BSF, and one that weaves by Indus river with its pristine cold waters, lined by the beautifully green and tall Poplar trees.

We started our hike from Karzok. Each day we would climb 1,000 to 2,000 feet and hike up to 10 Kms.We stayed in 2 person tents overnight. Our toilet was

only a hole in the ground, with no running water. The environment is extremely cold with temperatures hovering below -10 Deg C. So we were always covered in at least 4 layers of alpine clothing.

Climbing at high altitudes comes with multiple challenges. Your heart will be racing faster, you will be gasping for breath all the time and your muscles will fatigue much faster. Add to this bone chilling cold temperature, high speed winds and snow fall. To top it, there exists the real danger of Acute Mountain Sickness (AMS), that many are prone to. AMS can lead to fatal cerebral or pulmonary oedema. Other common high-altitude problems include vomiting, diarrhea, intense headaches, extreme breathlessness, insomnia, loss of hunger, etc. This is the stark reality of high altitude climbing!

On the Final Summit day, we were $woken\,up\,at\,2\,AM\,and\,given\,Oats\,porridge$ and warm water. There was total silence, no small talk and the mood was somber. We had our big summit climb ahead. We packed our lunch bags and filled our water flasks with hot water and



electrolytes. Then we put on our helmets to protect from rock fall, and strapped on our head lamps.

At 3 AM, our march to the summit started. The night was pitch black, but we could see stars above. Luckily, it was not snowing or raining. The climb was steep and we had to follow the leader and Sherpas. We could not see anything more than a few feet ahead. It was a sight to behold when you looked back. A string of pearly lights at various heights in the mountain – your fellow hikers making their way up one behind another.

It was a tough climb at night. Within 30 minutes, 3 climbers backed off and went back to Basecamp, for various reasons. The entire route is made up of huge boulders, deep crevasses and steep snow ice terrain. We were climbing on 45 deg inclines and steep cliff sides, with no clear pathways.

The dangerous part is walking on moraines, a layer of loosely packed rocks. One slip of the foot or handhold, you are dead! The cliff sides are thousands of feet deep. If you have fear of heights or

are prone to panic attacks, this summit day hike is just not for you!

Also, you must space yourself behind your hiker in front, in such a way that if his foot triggers a rockslide, you are not in its pathway. I had a very scary moment when a boulder came hurtling down straight at me, from way above. Luckily it stopped short of crashing into me. We were all wearing helmets to avoid head injuries due to such rock falls.

As we climbed higher, the extreme cold led to total numbness of toes and fingers. We just could not feel them anymore, although we were constantly moving. It's a very weird and extremely scary feeling. Our water inside the backpacks froze during the hike up, at night. Even our wet wipes froze!

Usually during such hikes, the trek leader sets a turn back time, for safety reasons. Our turn back time was 12 noon. But by 11 AM, I had hit 6,000+ metres (about 20,000 feet) and was on the Mentok ridge. This is higher than Mt. Kilimanjaro, Everest Basecamp, or Mt.Elbrus (highest peak in Europe). Sitting on a precarious ledge, it was a moment to remember and savor! Took

a couple of photos and it was time to turn back. The trek down was even more treacherous. I knew the hike down would be difficult but expected it to be at least easy on the lungs. But I was wrong. We had to take brief pauses every few minutes, to catch our breaths. Even with 2 hiking poles strongly planted in the ground, and my legs positioned steady and sideways, I was sliding down uncontrollably in many sections. We were fighting extremely dangerous and steep inclines, slippery moraines, crevasse, low oxygen and muscle fatigue. Finally,

we reached our base camp tents around 4 PM, after 13 hours of non-stop and intense hiking.

Our last day hike down from Base camp to low camp, was easy and enjoyable, given that we were all relaxed after the summit climb. The breathtaking scale of mountains in the Himalayas is to be seen and experienced on foot and can never be captured thru road trips or photos. It was an adventure well worth all the risks, and one that I will cherish for a lifetime. What is your next adventure?


Unique Hobbies


Dear 41er Family,
